AIM High Achievement Bands

Celebrating effort, culture, growth, leadership, and contribution

At Stratford Primary School, **AIMHigh** recognises students who show commitment, perseverance, and a willingness to challenge themselves – in learning, sport, culture, creativity, and service. In each area you can earn:

12 credits - Achievement Award

24 credits - Excellence Award

Credits can be earned in each category with a variety of activities.



Academic Band:

Recognises learning growth and curiosity. Students earn credits through progress in reading, writing, and maths, as well as science projects, problem solving, coding, competitions, and teaching others.

Arts & Cultural Band:

Values creativity, expression, and culture. Students can earn credits through art, music, drama, photography, digital design, kapa haka, and school productions.

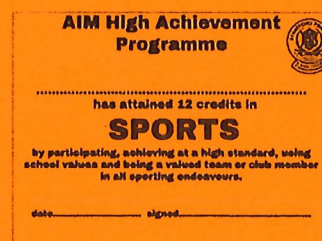


Service Band:

Recognises leadership and contribution to our school and community. Credits are earned through leadership roles, community service, and EnviroSchool projects that help improve school life and care for our environment.

Sports Band:
